Our January meeting will be a week earlier due to the Martin Luther King, Jr. commemoration the


following Monday, and the Presidential Inauguration as well. Please mark your calendars for this change in date. Please join us on Zoom.

Equal Rights Amendment Petition--Sign NOW!

The first sentence of the ERA reads, "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

- Witnessed history at the March on Washington, where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his legendary "I Have a Dream" speech, which helped pave the way for the Voting Rights Act of 1964.
- Continued her fight for equality in the North, advocating against the de facto segregation of Boston schools.

Mary Hemings Bell, sister of Sally Hemings

William Monroe Trotter, early civil rights pioneer, whose home is a designated National Historic Landmark

Organizations can co-sponsor Ms. Preacely's presentation for \$200, which includes 10 admission tickets and recognition in all event publicity.




