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Black History Month recognizes and honors important people and events in the history of African American history. In 1926, noted historian Carter G. Woodson originated the idea of "Negro History Week." Woodson chose the second week of February because it marked the birthdays of two Americans who influenced the lives and social condition of African Americans—former President Abraham Lincoln and abolitionist Frederick Douglass.

The tradition of what became Black History Month greatly influenced the expansion of academic scholarship and the corresponding recognition of the rich history of African Americans. By 1976 it became official, with President Gerald R. Ford declaring February as

Black History Month and calling on the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Each year, the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) chooses a different theme for Black History Month. For 2024, the theme is "African Americans and the Arts." African American artists have used art to preserve history and community memory as well as for empowerment, says ASALH. In 2024, they examine the varied history and life of African American arts and artisans. The mission of ASALH is to promote, research, preserve, interpret, and disseminate information about Black life, history, and culture to the global community. The Release of the Pauli Murray Quarter! A message from Rosita Stevens-Holsey

I am so proud to announce that the U.S. Mint has released the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray quarter dollar today. Pauli Murray will be the first honoree of their **2024** coins for their American Women Quarters Program. These coins were produced at U.S. Mint production facilities in Philadelphia and Denver.


Bags and rolls of circulation-quality 2024 American Women quarter dollars featuring the Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray will be offered by the U.S. Mint beginning at noon Eastern Time Feb. 15. The circulation-quality coins from production at the Denver and Philadelphia Mints are to be released into general circulation through the Federal Reserve on Jan. 2, 2024.

The U.S. Mint states that "Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray was a poet, writer, activist, lawyer, and Episcopal priest. She is regarded as one of the most

important social justice advocates of the twentieth century." Read more here.

According to Mint Director, Ventris C. Gibson, "Reverend Dr. Murray was keenly aware of the oppression that she faced as a Black woman. She lived her life and fought tirelessly as a steadfast advocate for civil rights and gender equality."

Bessie Coleman (1892-1926)



We are featuring Bessie Coleman who was a pioneer in aviation. Bessie was the first African American female pilot and the first Native American pilot as well. She was also the earliest known Black person to earn an international pilot's license. Below is more from Wikipedia.

Born to a family of sharecroppers in Texas, Coleman worked in the cotton fields at a young age while also studying in a small segregated school. She attended one term of college at Langston University. Coleman developed an early interest in flying, but African Americans, Native Americans, and women had no flight training opportunities in the United States, so she saved and obtained sponsorships in Chicago to go to France for flight school.

She then became a high-profile pilot in notoriously dangerous air shows in the United States. She was popularly known as "Queen Bess"

and "Brave Bessie", and hoped to start a school for African-American fliers. Coleman died in a plane crash in 1926. Her pioneering role was an inspiration to early pilots and to the African-American and Native American communities.
